Dear Friends

The "New Normal"

As we enter the month of May, for many Easter will be nothing but a distant memory; but the Church has for 2000 years called on us to see Easter not as a day, not even as a week, but as a season lasting a full 50 days. So, it will be Easter until the 23rd when we celebrate "Pentecost" (which means the 50th day).

This has coincided in 2021 with a time when we are readjusting our hopes and plans for what has become known as the "New Normal". Some people still talk in terms of "getting back to normal", but more and more we are recognising that we no longer know what "normal" is. We cannot go back but only forward into the unknown.

As we return to our High Streets, we will find familiar names missing – Mothercare, Debenhams, Peacocks, Jaeger, Edinburgh Woollen Mill, Topshop, Dorothy Perkins, Burton and Miss Selfridge to name just a few. Shopping has changed and few believe that there will be any going back.

And church has changed too. Many churches have no plans to re-open. Mounting pressure on finances will mean fewer paid clergy being spread ever more thinly. More positively, on-line church is here to stay. Our own local experience has been that many more people wish to engage with church online than ever attended our physical services.

On Easter Morning, I found myself saying, "Everything has changed" and if the Pandemic means that we cannot go back to the way things were, Easter and the message of Jesus risen from the dead means that we mustn't even try to do so; because the risen Christ calls us forward into the future not back to what was before.

Not many of us enjoy uncertainty. We like to know what is ahead and we like even more to have a sense of control as we go forward. As we await the "New Normal", we have neither of these, but the risen Christ calls us to walk with Him as we step where we have not stepped before.

ST LAURENCE CHURCH SERVICES

We are continuing to hold Sunday services in Church. There is **one service each Sunday at 10.30 am**. This will be Holy Communion each week except for the third Sunday of each month when it will be Morning Prayer. The services are short and simple without hymns, and communion is by wafer only. or Jo Parsons on 01725 512738, so that we can have some idea of numbers and make the necessary arrangements. We will maintain proper physical distancing and hygiene procedures will be observed, especially during the administration of communion. Face coverings must be worn.

There will also be a service for **Ascension Day at 7.30 am on Thursday 13**th **May**. This will be in the churchyard, weather permitting, or in church.

We will continue to have **recorded services**, but these will now be only three times a month. This will mean that we have services on the <u>services</u> <u>page of the church website</u> for the first, third and fourth Sundays in the month. There are service sheets on the website for all recorded Sunday and some other services which can be viewed or downloaded, enabling you to join in with prayers and responses. Within the Team, there are also online services available each week from <u>St Mary Redlynch</u> and <u>St Andrew Landford</u>.

Morning Worship continues to be said by the Vicar at 10.30.am on Wednesdays in church. This is <u>not</u> a public or recorded service, but he will ring the church bell at 10.30 am as a call to worship and you are encouraged to join him in a time of prayer from your own homes. On the third Wednesday of the month he will incorporate our Roads to God prayers (see page 7).

The Church is open for private prayer on Wednesdays, from 11.00 am to 12.00 pm. A member of the Church will be present at all times as a steward, and everyone will be asked to maintain physical distancing and to leave their contact details.

Peregrines nesting on the Cathedral tower

Last month we reported that the peregrines on the tower had laid four eggs. By 25th April they had all hatched. Newly hatched chicks are still wet and often quite exhausted after the rigours of emerging from the egg, and are closely brooded by the female at this stage.

They soon dry out however and within a few hours appear fluffy in their familiar white down. They spend most of their time asleep in the early days, mostly beneath the female, but a little later, especially on warm days, they huddle together in the open in a white 'heap', perhaps to help keep warm.

The adult female feeds her tiny chicks in a wonderfully gentle and patient way, giving them only the tiniest of morsels at a time. The chicks will now develop fast, and should fledge in perhaps the first week of June.

I am preparing this update on 12th April – the day the country moves into Step 2 of the Government's Roadmap to recovery. It has seemed a long time coming, and the lockdown over these past three winter months has been particularly hard on many people, not least many of our Link clients who have felt isolated and unable to get out of the house.

Thankfully, the vaccine roll out has been a huge success and by the time you read this a significant proportion of people in the older age groups will have received both jabs and with that a level of confidence and optimism.

With the opening of more shops and hairdressers we anticipate a steady increase in demand for our transport services and we will do all we can to meet that demand, although we must give priority to essential medical and dental appointments. I am pleased to say that we have been successful in recruiting a number of volunteer drivers before and since Christmas and I am hopeful that most of our volunteers will be returning to drive for us, although after a year's gap there may be some who have decided that it is their time to retire.

Spring is a good time to make plans and I remain optimistic that life will, as we move into the summer, get back to some sort of normality, although I am bound to say the impact of this last year will leave lasting memories, good and bad, on all of us. The task facing me and the committee is to plan for the future of "The Link" in this area, not only in terms of recruitment of volunteer drivers, but also volunteers to help with the governance of our registered charity.

We particularly need volunteers, who don't have to be drivers, to join our two transport coordinators and help to spread the work. It can be a rewarding use of your time and not onerous if you enjoy talking to people, and making a difference to people's lives. Or perhaps you could take on a role on the committee?

The recycling shed, organised by Downton Green Group, is situated round the back of the Baptist Church in South Lane. And the good news is that we are now able to re-open in a limited way! The shed has had a clear out and refresh so that it is ready for some of your recycling again. Please leave items in the correct containers.



We are now collecting:

Pet food pouches (clean and dry); Toothpaste tubes, toothbrushes;

Crisp packets; Plastic confectionery wrappers;

Low energy light bulbs and Water filter cartridges

Please be aware that at present we can collect only what we know we can move on safely. If there's no labelled container, then we are not currently collecting that item! Unfortunately, if something is left that we are not collecting it will be thrown away. As will batches of mixed recycling - we currently don't have the resources to sort out a mixture of items.

If you are leaving pet food packaging or crisp packets, please read the extra information on how to package them to help.

Please don't leave batteries - they are easy to recycle at the Co-op or the Pharmacy - or anywhere that sells them........

There you can recycle crisp packets, plastic sweet wrappers, baby food pouches, Pringles tubes...... We are hoping to increase our range in future, but do not have the capacity to do so at the moment.

The Lover Lock-Down Story

Lover is a small village eight miles south of Salisbury and in March 2019 a small group of retired people with many varying craft skills set up a REPAIR CAFÉ, meeting every Wednesday morning to offer repair help to the local community. This very quickly grew to a membership of 26 in the Team serving an area of approximately twenty miles radius.

And then in March 2020 along came 'Lock-down'. This really frustrated the management team as we were prohibited from using the local Village Hall and also from gathering together for a coffee, a chat and communal repairs. There was a real determination to continue the helpful service especially for the many vulnerable senior citizens in the locality.

So, having carefully checked the Government Covid Regulations and the available resources, we came up with the idea of a 'REMOTE REPAIR CENTRE' as a temporary means of continuing the service. In fact we were prepared to offer the service on both the Wednesday and Friday mornings; after all where else were we going to go during Covid?

We were in the fortunate position of having a member of the Group living nearly opposite the Village Hall; he also had a double garage in his front garden with lots of room on the driveway for access. On checking with the helpers it was found that we had six who were willing and able to 'Work from Home' along with two more (an electrician and a joiner) plus an Administrator/Treasurer, all duly masked up and 'Covid aware'. And so we were all set to continue the operations. Following a lot of publicity we soon found that people could and would walk by and drop off items, and also arrange to drive by and drop off their repair works.

We very quickly became a Drop-off & Pick-up Service, as the idea was that we simply took in and registered an item, farmed it out for repair, and phoned the client when it was ready for pick-up.

Fortunately for us word got around, and we have now gained more helpers with specialist skills and improved our ability to provide answers to any queries. Our outstanding concern is locating a Weaver for chair repairs.

The Lover Lock-Down Story (continued)

As can be imagined various 'problems' cropped up along the way, but our Motto is "Do not Bin it – We may Fix it"; so with that in mind, we have always been able to adjust our delivery to fit in with requirements. For instance, how do you use a garage in the middle of winter? You go to a local Marquee Manufacturer and he makes you a fantastic PVC awning that slides & clips on the front on the garage. How do you overcome the heating problem? You purchase a gas fired heater. How do you overcome IT issues? Simply get our own engineers to devise a method of operating. How do you resolve Covid Regs? We continually monitor and adjusted our procedures in accordance with requirements; at the lowest point we simply had one operative on duty receiving & passing on the jobs.

As you may well imagine our Clients were very pleased to have this service which only costs the value of the materials used and if they wished, a donation to a local charity. It was not long before someone mentioned their concern for the Hospital Staff dealing with Covid patients and as a result we checked with the NHS Hospital at Salisbury to see if we could donate specifically to support ALL their NHS Staff. They agreed to our proposal, and incredibly in the last twelve months we have been able to provide £5,500 that is going to support them in the way of mental health treatment, rest room facilities, special treats etc.

As for the work coming in, recently we broke our one day record by receiving 23 jobs in a day! Our works cover every sphere of activity from electrics to electronics, ceramics to clocks, bikes to brass-work, mowers to metal-work etc. We are very pleased that at present we are running at a 93% success rate.

Our Story has no ending we simply await the next exciting episode; the adventure is in the overcoming.



Redlynch Local History Society Talk on 6th April 2021

Ruth Butler, Heritage Education Officer at Wiltshire and Swindon History Centre, gave us an on-line talk about Extraordinary Wiltshire Women. We learnt about several very different women starting in the 12th century and finishing in the 20th century. They all made their mark in a world often dominated by men.

Ela of Salisbury (1187-1261) When her father William FitzPatrick, 2nd Earl of Salisbury, died in 1196 she became of Countess of Salisbury. In her early teens she married William Longespee and he became 3rd Earl of Salisbury and Sheriff of Wiltshire. Ela and William used their wealth to wield influence and power: they were among the dignitaries to lay the foundation stones of Salisbury Cathedral in 1220 and provided financial support. In 1226 William was poisoned and died; Ela commissioned an elaborate tomb and he was the first person to be buried in the Cathedral. The title reverted to Ela and she refused to remarry (Magna Carta protected women from being forced to remarry). She was one of only two women in medieval England to hold the position of Sheriff, inheriting it from William and paying Henry III to secure it. She established Lacock Abbey in 1232 and became its first abbess.

Mary Herbert, Countess of Pembroke (1561 -1621) Mary had an extensive education and was taught scripture and classics, trained in rhetoric, was fluent in French, Italian and Latin and knew some Greek and Hebrew. In 1577 she married Henry Herbert, 2nd Earl of Pembroke. At Wilton she established an "academy of literature" and many poets and playwrights visited, including her brother Sir Philip Sidney and Shakespeare and Ben Johnson. She is buried in the quire of Salisbury Cathedral and the epitaph reads "Underneath this marble hearse/Lies the subject of all verse/Sidney's sister, Pembroke's mother/Death! Ere thou has slain another/ Wise and fair and good as she/Time shall throw a dart at thee"

Arundel Penruddock and Lady Blanche Arundell both fought to protect their families during the civil wars and Cromwell's rule. In 1643, a 60 year old Lady Blanche defended her home (Wardour Castle) when a 1300 strong Parliamentarian army besieged it. She led her family, servants and a small force of 25 men for five days before surrendering. In 1655 royalist Colonel John Penruddock of Compton Chamberlayne led a failed rebellion against Cromwell's Protectorate.

He was imprisoned in Exeter and his wife Arundel wrote pleas for clemency to Cromwell. These failed and he was executed for treason but Arundel continued to petition Cromwell on her own behalf and her seven children.

Edith Olivier (1872 – 1948) She was a campaigner, author, Wilton Mayor and pillar of society. During the First World War Edith established the Women's Land Army in Wiltshire and was later awarded the MBE. After the war she moved to Daye House on the Wilton Estate and hosted and attended parties with Stephen Tennant, Siegfried Sassoon, Rex Whistler, the Sitwells and Cecil Beaton. Edith found both Ashcombe House in Cranbourne Chase and Reddish House at Broadchalke for Cecil Beaton. Edith had a close relationship with Rex Whistler; she provided stability and a refuge at Daye House.

Matilda Talbot (1872 - 1958) Matilda moved to Lacock Abbey to care for her uncle, Charles Talbot. In 1916 her uncle died and left the estate to her, and in 1944 she gave Lacock Abbey, the village and Manor Farm to The National Trust. She donated the Lacock copy of the Magna Carta to the British Museum.

Mary Mildred Bruce (1895 – 1990) At the age of 15 Mary was banned from driving for a year after racing her brother's motorcycle on the road. She graduated to cars and in 1926 she married the Hon Victor Austin Bruce; they took part in Monte Carlo rallies and in 1927 drove to the Arctic Circle. She owned a speed boat company and then bought an aeroplane. In 1950, now divorced, she moved to Bradford on Avon and was running glove factories in Warminster and Cardiff. In Warminster in 1980 her papers were found in a derelict glove factory and deposited at Wiltshire and Swindon History Centre. When she was 79 she test-drove a Ford Capri at 110 mph at Thruxton racetrack. You can read more about her colourful life here:-




